

#### Presbytery News

1<sup>st</sup> January this year saw the new Presbytery of Lothian and Borders created by uniting the former presbytery of Lothian with Duns, Melrose and Peebles and Jedburgh presbyteries. Rev Norman Smith was appointed as Presbytery clerk, Rev Peter Wood as Presbytery Missions Officer and Caroline Kirk as Presbytery Administrator.

Uniting 4 presbyteries, all with their different presbytery plans to implement is a huge task but is progressing. The committee whose task it is to oversee the implementation are having discussions with ministers and will in time have discussions with Kirk Sessions. Norman Smith and Peter Wood are very keen that the focus of presbytery is not on the implementation of the plans but on the mission of the church in worship, service and sharing the good news of Jesus in our communities.

Indeed Peter Wood led our discussions at the last Away Day. He was so interesting and challenging that people requested that he come to the next Away Day in the spring to continue helping us explore what mission would look like in our communities.

## The mystery of beauty


When you hear a bird singing, it makes your heart sing too. Many birds seem to have perfect pitch and some even change key in the same song. Some can sing two notes simultaneously, and the nightingale actually sings harmonies.

The purpose for birds is just communication but, curiously, to us it's far more.

And, did you know that there is absolute beauty — not just in the eye of the beholder but appreciated by everyone? Apparently so. It can be measured with maths (a subject which experts say is "beautiful" too, but the way, though it elegance bypassed me at school!)

There is a special number called phi — (the 21<sup>st</sup> Greek letter) 1.6180339887, also called the Golden Number, Golden Section or Divine proportion. It's a ratio of proportion which results in beauty — every time! Fascinatingly, it appears everywhere in nature — whether the huyman body, plan structures or the soolar system. And in the human world of art and architecture, not to mention the word structure of the Bible.

It creates the best acoustics in the design of music studios, cathedrals and many musical instruments. The ancient Egyptians and Greeks used it in their buildings, which we still appreciate as beautiful today (unlike some modern "monstrous, carbuncles"!) It also produces a balance and a harmony which we call beautiful.



#### Let's face it

Scientists have even found that the human faces most universally admired by all races are those with measurements closest to phi.

Then there's the Fibonacci series — a sequence of number formed by adding together the two previous numbers as in 0, 1, 1, 2,3,5,8,13, etc.

It occurs in the proportions of nature, from the spirals of seashells and number of petals in a flower, to the pattern of seeds on a flower head, the leaves around stems ... even the construction of the human ear! And, we see beauty in all these things ... apart from perhaps the human ear!

So why is there a mathematical design built into the universe and why does it cause beauty?

The answer can only be the Designer of it all — "The Great Mathematician." A great physicist Paul Dirac said: "God used beautiful mathematics in creating the world."

Or as Ralph Waldo Emerson put it: "Beauty is God's handwriting."

The auestion is, "Are you reading it or ignoring it?"

#### Eyemouth Foodbank

With the ongoing rise in the cost of living the foodbank continues to be needed and well used. The foodbank covers the East Coast of Berwickshire and inland towards Ayton, Foulden and Grantshouse. The numbers for each month have remained fairly



quiet over the Summer, however over the last three months of the year the foodbank has seen a marked increase and has delivered 116 food parcels feeding around 225 people.

The two biggest needs for the foodbank is volunteers to help with organising the foodstore and for money to pay for the fresh produce and food vouchers that goes into each parcel. ### Eyemouth RE:NEW Project Update

It's wonderful to be back in the building and using the new space in Eyemouth. We've had some lovely comments from members of the church and the wider community about how welcoming and useful the new space is as well as warm, bright, spacious and comfortable it is. We have certainly achieved what we set out to do.

Although the contractor has left the building there are still a number of cosmetic items needing to be dealt with so you may see changes and re-organising happening all around the building as we figure out what extra things we need to make the space work for us and the community.

Financially the project has come in on budget which was only possible thanks to the hard work of the RENEW team and in particular the tireless efforts of our Quantity Surveyor, John Lockhart, whose wisdom and insight have meant not only that the project got off the ground in the first place, but continued to stay on budget over the course of several delays and changes required due to issues with supplies of building materials.

Looking forward we are planning a special opening celebration weekend in January (13th/14th) to which we will invite all those within our community who supported or contributed towards the work. On the Sunday we will have a special service and a lunch afterwards for the congregation.
